Why The Japanese Beetle Quarantine?

Primarily an import export issue, the Japanese beetle problem arose when infested nursery stock started arriving from nurseries to our east. Even though the few established infestations in Colorado were being actively treated, we had no way to close the door on reinfestation. It was perceived by other western states that nothing was being done in Colorado to control the spread of the infestation, so several western states began establishing their own quarantines to control the spread of Japanese Beetle into their states. Colorado nurseries looking to ship plants to other western states became aware that if nothing were done, they would loose access to their trading partners in those states.

In March of 2008 a Japanese Beetle committee was formed to address the problem. After more than a year of information sharing with as many stakeholders in the issue as possible it was determined that an amendment to the Nursery Act and development of the quarantine was the most practical plan, establishing Colorado as a Category Two Enforced state.

Approved November 19th 2009, the quarantine went into effect January 1st 2010. The first full year will be one of education and implementation. Simple record keeping will need to be done and inspections from the Colorado Department of Agriculture will be conducted, but no fines will be issued. Enforcement will begin January 1st 2011.
